A Message from Reverend Paul Swartz our Founding Development Pastor

May 15, 2023

Dear Followers of Christ the Redeemer,

Betty and I send our sad regrets that we are not where we'd like to be this weekend with you to celebrate the Fiftieth anniversary of CRLC. You nevertheless took advantage of reminding us how "old" we are and the reality of physical limitations age can so often impose! Betty's impaired vision makes travel uncomfortable for her with threatening images coming at her, and while she encouraged me to travel, I do not feel comfortable leaving her alone and being that far away. Otherwise, we are thankful for our relatively good health and spirit.

First and foremost, congratulations on 50 Years of faithful ministry! How humbled and privileged to have been called to join a great procession of pastors whose pioneering spirit and commitment led them to venture forth to plant the Church and then to witness it's fruitful ministry as the bodily presence of Christ our Redeemer.

I believe the challenge of any anniversary is to discover that inspired path that leads us as individuals, congregations, communities, Church and Nation to avoid two equally threatening dangers. Anniversaries can serve to reinforce myths and entrenched, often exaggerated, narratives of the past, rather than encourage us to look afresh at historical events and the culture surrounding them. On the other hand, anniversaries can also serve to disparage the past as irrelevant by ignoring the enduring value and guiding principles embedded in the "rest of the story" those events and individuals impart.

Looking back at that historic time in our observance of the 50th anniversary of the founding of CRLC, I certainly don't need to resort to embellishment to describe the enthusiasm, interest, and excitement we experienced. From arriving in Brecksville in October 1972, I initially set out to meet all the local clergy to introduce myself and to assure them I was not coming to steal sheep from their flocks, but rather to visit and invite those unchurched individuals and families to a new venture. One of those pastors, Vernon Holloway, on a subsequent meeting asked me where we would hold worship services. I confessed that I did not know but was confident that God would provide. His response was, "Well, I guess your prayer is answered. God has provided because our congregation would like to invite you to share our facilities." Thus began the relationship with the Brecksville United Church of Christ which housed CRLC for, I believe, its first fourteen years.

In making calls on over 3000 homes in the Fall and trudging through the winter snow, I recall the elderly man on Hilton Road who invited me to come into his home. It was not my practice, but under the circumstance I could not resist after he told me he had built that home years ago and never could get the priest to visit him. Admitting he would not be a prospect for the new congregation, he wondered if I could fulfill his wish of having a visit by priest in his home and to bless it before he died. A Lutheran pastor would do!

My standard question after introducing myself to residents at the door, was not inquiring what church they attended, but rather what they thought the churches could be doing to make Brecksville a better place in which to live. I was shocked to discover that the number one concern expressed was getting the garbage collected on the day scheduled. I took that concern to Mayor Jack Hruby and the head of the Sanitation Department. They invited me to a City Council meeting that was covered by the Cleveland Plain Dealer and the local Sun Courier. The new mission being developed received such positive exposure which money could not purchase in advertising, that I soon discovered myself being greeted by name with expressions of gratitude on subsequent visits throughout the city.

Some may recall another incident involving the Mayor's circus fund raising event for a Senior Citizen's Bus CRLC was spearheading for the community. A good public and political position in an election year except he allegedly used public funds to underwrite the circus which was a flop. His opponent met with me and demanded my presence at Saturday's public square campaign event to reveal what I knew about the circus financing. I responded that I would not be present as an advocate for his campaign, but in turn invited him to worship with us. He showed up that Sunday during the sermon with a loaded pistol and thankfully, Tom Rardin, the head usher and an observant FBI agent, wrestled him to the floor when he saw the gun aimed at me in the pulpit! I kept preaching not knowing exactly what the scuffle in the back of the sanctuary was about.

I could go on about the outreach service the congregation rendered in its infancy like sponsoring, providing housing in the parsonage, and supporting two 21 year old refugee men from Vietnam financially in their resettlement; committing 25% of our offerings for Benevolence; bucking the suggestion of the Mission Board of the national LCA to take a capital fund offering on Organizational Sunday and choosing instead to receive a special offering of gratitude to be used toward the LCA's development of another new congregation.

Then too, the gathering community was blessed with the shared gifts and skills of so many: in printing and assembling bulletins and newsletters and a host of behind the scene, but valuable tasks; educators like Francine Buban and Jean Dorow, recruiting and training teachers so we could offer team teaching in Sunday School for three year olds through adults before we officially became a congregation; the competent leadership of those willing to help guide the development and direction of the new mission as a Service Committee headed by John Basista who would then lead the Board of Ministers as President of the congregation; and with musical talent in Doug and Marilyn Farr, we had directors for choirs to enrich our worship experiences; and the opportunity to share in magnificent festival worship services with our hosts.

A Message from Reverend Paul Swartz our Founding Development Pastor (con't)

It would be a major neglect if I failed to acknowledge the crucial support I have had in Betty throughout my ministry and her partnership and enthusiastic encouragement in these ministry ventures to which I was called. With an infant in our home, she planned and hosted several open houses with five or six couples invited each evening for several weeks before the first worship service. Having people come together, getting acquainted with others sharing a common interest in the new mission permitted enthusiasm and support to breed and became the pivotal foundation upon which a spirited sense of community developed.

God's mission has the Church—the faithful people of God—to proclaim the Good News, and to be the physical presence of Christ's body in the world until the end of time. It thus seems to me that the primary job of our life together is to nurture, equip, send, and sustain persons as they seek to respond to God's call to serve in and through what they are doing already as parents, students, workers, citizens, and as neighbors. St Paul characterizes this privileged dynamic as being "ambassadors for Christ since God is making His appeal through us"—the Church! God's mission has the Church and that is you, the Body of Christ, faithfully serving Him as your Lord and Savior by serving and loving your neighbor.

It has certainly been my highest honor to have been entrusted with the joy of establishing a new community of committed and dedicated disciples and treasuring the discovery that I was having to run to keep up with where their contagious excitement was leading them, not only to become a church, but to *BE* the Church founded by Christ the Redeemer!



50K for 50 Years!

As Christ the Redeemer Lutheran Church celebrates its 50th anniversary this year, we have taken on a big financial goal for this year in addition to our regular giving. We are setting a goal to raise \$50,000 to mark this golden anniversary. What will we do with this money? It will be used for Outreach and Inreach.

<u>For Outreach:</u> We hope to give one-half our goal, \$25,000, to Redeemer Crisis Center that will enhance their ability to serve people in need.

<u>For Inreach:</u> We hope, as a gift to the congregation, to also use the other half, \$25,000, to refurbish the outdoor chapel. The benches are experiencing weather rot, as well as the altar. We hope to replace the benches with a composite recycle material that will last for long time. In addition to replacing the altar and possibly the cross, we hope to place a time capsule in the ground below the altar to be opened at the 100th anniversary.

"How do we understand the Bible?"

Pastor Randy will be leading this Summer education series

Pastor Randy has been talking about the basics of our faith on this side of the pandemic. Pastor Blair Morgan led an overview of the Bible in the adult classroom. Pastor Randy is giving a refresher from a series he gave over 9 years ago about how the Bible was put together and how we approach it.

This class is for you if any of the following apply:

- If you are completely new to studying the Bible and have always wanted to know more...
- If you have always had questions about studying the Bible...
- If you wonder why Christians often have different perspectives on the Bible...
- If you have read the Bible before and often feel overwhelmed by it...
- If you are a veteran reader of the Bible and would like a refresher course....

This is the series for you! No expertise or experience necessary!

We will be looking at how we got the Bible, how we approach the Bible, and how we are guided by the Bible. Pastor Randy will lead these sessions, though for the core of the study we will be viewing lectures by Dr. Mark Allen Powell, a Lutheran pastor and former Bible professor at Trinity Lutheran Seminary in Columbus, Ohio, about how Lutherans interpret the Bible.

READINGS FOR JUNE

June 4 — The Holy Trinity

Though the word *trinity* is not found in the scriptures, today's second reading includes the apostolic greeting that begins the liturgy: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. In the gospel Jesus sends his disciples forth to baptize in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. More than a doctrine, the Trinity expresses the heart of our faith: we have experienced the God of creation made known in Jesus Christ and with us always through the Holy Spirit. We celebrate the mystery of the Holy Trinity in word and sacrament, as we profess the creed, and as we are sent into the world to bear witness to our faith.

Genesis 1:1--2:4a Psalm 8 2 Cor 13:11-13 Matthew 28:16-20

June 11 — Pentecost 2

Though Jesus was a devout Jew who practiced his faith, he was criticized for eating with tax collectors and sinners—the religiously nonobservant. Jesus criticizes the self-righteous and reminds us that mercy is to be at the heart of our religious practices. God continues to be made known in those on the margins of society, like Matthew the tax collector and the hemorrhaging woman. As we gather each Lord's day we receive the healing that makes us well and sends us forth to be signs of God's mercy for the world.

June 18 — Pentecost 3

Moses tells the Israelites that they are called to be a priestly kingdom and a holy people. Jesus sends out the disciples as laborers into the harvest. In baptism we too are anointed for ministry, sharing God's compassion with our needy world. From the Lord's table we go forth to proclaim the good news, to heal the sick, and to share our bread with the hungry.

<u>June 25 — Pentecost 4</u>

God does not promise that the path of the disciple will be easy. Jeremiah feels the pain of rejection from those who do not want to hear what he has to say. Jesus declares that his words may bring stark division. Even so, we need not be afraid for God accounts for each hair on our heads. Though we may experience rejection, frustration, division, and death, God's grace and love make us a new creation each day. Marked with the cross and filled with holy food, we are sent from worship to witness to Christ in the world.

Health News

For many, cancer is the disease they fear most - it is an emotional and psychological experience as well as physical.

Most people have family, friends or themselves been impacted by cancer. Therefore, during the next 3 months, let's focus on a more in-depth look at cancer.

Cancer causes cells to divide uncontrollably. It also prevents them from dying at the natural point in their life cycle. Some types of cancer cause rapid cell growth, while others cause cells to grow and divide at a slower rate. Cancerous cells lack the components that instruct them to stop dividing. Cancerous cells can form tumors, impair the immune system and cause other changes that prevent the body from functioning regularly. https://www.medicalnewstoday.com/articles/323648

The name for many cancers derives from the type of cells in which the cancer begins. They are also divided into "solid" (tumor) cancer type or blood-related cancers ~ Myelomas: plasma cells; Leukemias: blood cells; Lymphomas: immune system.

Genetic factors and lifestyle choices, such as smoking & heavy alcohol consumption, can contribute to the development of the disease. Several elements affect the ways that DNA communicates with cells and directs their division and death. **Age is an unpreventable risk** – 87% of cancer diagnosis is in people aged 50 or older.

When cancerous cells spread to other parts of the body, the medical term for this is *metastasis*. When a person has cancer, the outlook will depend on whether the disease has spread plus on its *type, severity, and location*.

After nonmelanoma skin cancer, breast cancer is the *most common type* in the U.S. However, <u>lung cancer</u> is the leading cause of cancer-related **death**.

Treatments are prescribed based on the **type** of cancer, its **stage** at diagnosis, and the person's *overall health*. *Treatments are constantly improving*. Examples of current methods include **chemotherapy**, **radiation therapy**, **and surgery**. Some people benefit from newer options, such as **stem cell transplantation and precision medicine**.

67 % of cancer survivors were diagnosed 5 or more years ago. Nearly half are age 70 or older. Most survivors have had common cancers - breast, prostate, colorectal, melanoma.

Knowledge is power. Cancer impact is minimized by early detection & treatment changing the "auto" mental reaction to hope, versus fear. Live a life that includes a focus on health and trust in the Lord in all circumstances.

I pray that you have healing hope thru Christ: "I am leaving you with a gift -peace of mind and heart.

And the peace I give isn't like the peace the world gives. So don't be troubled or afraid." (John 14:27)

Mission Trip Indianapolis, Indiana June 18-23, 2023

"Praising God and Serving Others" . . . This is exactly what the youth do when we go on a Mission Trip. We go on these mission trips on the years that there is no National Youth Gathering. I believe that many of our youth don't realize there are people in need so close to our church so I make it a priority to go to a destination that is only four to eight hours away.

This year, the mission trip is to Indianapolis, Indiana on June 18-23. We chose Indianapolis because of the serving opportunities which can include working in a soup kitchen, children's program, elder care facility, clothing distribution center or in a food shelf.

The program is coordinated by Youth Works, a Christian based organization based in Minnesota. The youth going on the trip will attend church service at CRLC on June 18 which includes a sendoff and prayer by Pastor Randy. Then we depart and travel to Indianapolis, arriving about 4 PM.



Upon arrival, the four coordinators from Youthworks greet our group as well as the youth and adults from other churches. In total, there are typically about 65 and 18 adult leaders. Breakfast, lunch and dinner are all provided by Youthworks.

Each day begins with breakfast (adults have a meeting to prepare for the day during breakfast) followed by devotions (private time for each youth and adult to reflect on a theme of the day). Then off for the Work Day. Our youth are often combined with another church. Youthworks coordinates the service that is needed in the area. Over the years, I have built a wheelchair ramp, helped at a day care, repaired and painted a house, helped in a food bank, landscaping, visited a senior center, demolished a kitchen (to get it ready for remodeling), mowing overgrown fields in a park and promoted a community cookout.



After a much needed shower, everyone has free time. In the evening, after dinner, there is typically a planned event followed by worship and church group. During worship, one of the YouthWorks staff typically tells their story. Since they are in college, they really relate to the youth. One of the evenings is a community cookout where the youth cook and serve dinner to the needy in the area. I typically ask the YouthWorks directors if our church youth can prepare the meals (usually grilling). It is great to see how they respond when helping others . . . and if you know anything about Papa T, I am there to assist but the youth get the most out of the experience.



Not only is this a way for our youth to help others. This is also a perfect "bonding time" that will last for years . . . just ask the youth that are in college or beyond. The connections made with the youth, the adult leaders and the Youthworks staff is truly amazing when you consider that you are only together for five days.



I want to thank the congregation for their continued support of the youth. I look forward to having another great experience in Indianapolis.
