

### **Altar Flowers**



Thank you to all who signed up to sponsor the altar flowers. In case you are wondering who makes the arrangement for us, it is the Brecksville Heinen's floral department. They have been kind enough to do this for many years at a <u>very</u> reasonable cost - -\$35. If we were to go to a regular floral shop the cost for the size of arrangement, we get would be at least \$60 if not more - - yes floral arrangements are very expensive! Heinen's no longer makes flower arrangements for the general public, they do this as a

community service for our church (and only our church since we have been with them for so many years). Please do <u>not</u> ask them to make an arrangement for your own use.

The church has a total of seven vases that are the correct size and shape for the kind of arrangement we need. Heinen's does <u>not</u> provide the vase. The person sponsoring the arrangement may take it home after the second service and enjoy. When the flowers have wilted, throw away the flowers and wash the vase. Please return the vase to the church office. This is where I pick up the vase to re-use! A little hint to keep the flowers fresh longer is to regularly change the water and add one capful of liquid bleach. Although many of you would like to clean out your closet of old vases, please do not give them to the church - only the vase that we use for the altar flowers is to be returned. Another hint, if you want to get rid of your old vases take them to a florist (Floral Shop) and many will give you credit toward flowers for yourself.

At the beginning of each week, I email the person sponsoring the flowers asking what they would like for the dedication and if there is anything special they would like for the arrangement (colors) or if they are happy with the "Florist's Choice". Pastor Randy/Office try to put together the power point that includes the dedication we see on the screens at the Sunday Service early in the week (usually Tuesday). So please, send in your dedication to me ASAP when you get your reminder email. The flowers that Heinen's has to work with are ordered from the buyer at the corporate office. The Brecksville Heinen's does not know from week to week what they will be getting. So with that in mind if you request particular colors or types of flowers they may or may not be able to fulfill your request - - they certainly try if possible. Unless you have a specific reason for particular colors/flowers (beyond "pastels" or "bright & bold"), I always recommend the "Florist's Choice". This allows them to use the freshest flowers and be creative.

To pay for the church flowers simply write a check to CRLC for \$35 and put on the memo line "altar flowers". Place in envelope (or can put cash in envelope) and write on outside of envelope your name and "altar flowers". The envelope can be placed in the offering plate or given to the church office.

### Celebrating the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Schlicker/Holkamp Organ 1973-2023

In celebration of the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the CRLC organ, I'd like to share some history of the organ builders of this instrument: The Schlicker Organ Company, Buffalo, New York and the Holtkamp Organ Company, Cleveland, Ohio. In next month's newsletter, I will share the history of Saint John's Lutheran Church, Sinking Spring, Pennsylvania, the former home of the CRLC organ.

The Schlicker Organ Company was founded in 1930 by Herman L. Schlicker, a third-generation builder, who apprenticed with firms in Germany, France and Denmark before emigrating to America in the late 1920's. It was at this time that organ building in America was in the infancy of a reform movement which would shift tonal philosophy away from orchestral stop lists which were based upon 8' pitches of a solo/accompaniment idiom and performance literature that drew heavily upon transcriptions. There was growing consensus among musicologists that the listening experience could be enhanced by performing music of a given period on instruments authentic to that period.

Riding the wave of this organ reform movement, which became a pendulum swing reaction to the excesses of early twentieth century organ building, Herman built literally hundreds of organs during the ensuing decades. He was at the forefront of the neo-baroque revival building organs after the "Werk-Prinzip" in good German tradition. His organs are characterized by attention to detail in the upper work and possess a brightness and clarity of tone along with a slightly thin edginess in the plenum. This was in keeping with the narrow scaling and no-nicking style of voicing in vogue at the time. His reeds are quite German in nature.

Schlicker organs have proved to be very reliable and Herman's console design was a unique contribution. Trim and chaste in appearance, a Schlicker console gives the organist a clear, straightforward view of the stops as well as a very positive "toggle-action" to the feel. Many were graced with luxuriously thick and beveled ivory keys as well.

It is this trim and attractive console along with a pleasing tonal scheme that contributed to the company's leadership in the practice organ genre. Capitalizing on the townhouse sub bass octave, the Schlicker practice organs were compact and by far the most popular. There is hardly an organ student, even today that has not spent many hours at the console of one. They possess an unusual degree of dependability and are still highly sought after even in today's pro-tracker environment.

Following Herman's untimely death in 1974, the Schlicker Organ Company was directed by his son-in-law, Ralph Dinwiddie. Not being an organ builder, he sold the company in the early 1980's. The company again changed hands in 1992 and was acquired by Matters, Inc., an innovative supplier to pipe organ builders in September, 2002. One of America's oldest and most respected pipe organ builders, the Holtkamp Organ Company traces its lineage back over a century to 1855 when G.F. Votteler established a shop for the manufacture of organs in Cleveland, Ohio. Management of the company during this period has included two generations of Vottelers and four generations of Holt-kamps. In 1903, the first of the Holtkamps, Herman Heinrich, came from St. Mary's Ohio to join the then retiring Henry Votteler. Control of the company, now named Votteler Holtkamp Sparling Company passed to Herman's son Walter in 1931. The Holtkamp Organ Company emerged in 1951 and continues today. In 1956 Walter Holtkamp, Jr. became associated with his father, assuming control of the firm in 1962. In 1987 F. Christian Holtkamp joined the firm, the fourth generation of Holtkamps to be active in this small Cleveland Company dedicated to the art of organ building.

During the Votteler years, the first instruments were built in and around Cleveland, Ohio. The work was primarily mechanical action. The instruments were generally one or two manuals, with robust construction and ornate casework.

Henry Holtkamp constructed numerous instruments in his 30 years of organ building. The first instruments were in and around Cleveland, Ohio but as the firm prospered his field of activity extended from Pennsylvania west to the Dakotas. His work reflected the aesthetic of his time, that of the orchestrally oriented organ. Henry Holtkamp devoted a large part of his time and efforts endeavoring to duplicate the sounds of the symphony orchestra. Many of his instruments continue in use today.

Under the direction of Walter Holtkamp, Sr. (1894-1962) the reputation of the company grew until it became known as one of the finest in the country. Holtkamp was an early pioneer of the so -called "organ reform movement" in this country. The organ reform movement was a departure from the orchestrally oriented tones of the previous generations. Musicians and organ builders

sought a return to the century's old aesthetic of the pipe organ as an instrument of church and church-oriented music. The literature of the organ reform movement was the traditional literature of such composers as Bach, Buxtehude, Couperin and Frescobaldi rather than organ transcriptions of Wagner and other 19th century orchestral composers.

Walter Holtkamp, Jr. succeeded his father as head of the company in 1961. Under his leadership the firm has maintained its reputation as one of America's leading designers and builders of organs. Soon after assuming control, Walter Holtkamp, Jr. introduced the principle of mechanical key action to the firm, thus realizing a goal attempted by his father in the mid-thirties but abandoned because America was not yet ready to accept this then radical idea in organ building. Today significant instruments, of both mechanical and electro pneumatic action leaves the firm each year. Walter Holtkamp, Jr. retired in 1997.

In 1987 F. Christian Holtkamp entered into partnership with his father. Since that time, he has had many responsibilities throughout the firm, including: tuning and maintenance, management of the company pipe shop, company draftsman, voicing, and director of tonal design. In 1995 he became President and Managing Director of the firm with responsibility for all operations in the shop. In 1997 he assumed all responsibilities for sales and visual design. This, combined with his experience as an organist, including a Master of Music Degree in organ performance, provides an exceptionally broad background for the leadership of the firm. He currently designs and coordinates all essential details of each instrument that the firm produces, including tonal design, scaling, voicing, structural design, and visual design. This results in instruments which are exceptionally well balanced and coordinated in all their many elements, and a very high degree of consistent quality from year to year.

The Holtkamp firm is much the same today as it was in 1922 when it opened its new factory at 2909 Meyer Avenue. It remains small, employing about twenty skilled craftsmen. In fact the firm may well be of optimum size for the production of pipe organs; large enough to allow the employ of specialists in certain phases of the art of organ building yet small enough for the proprietor to assume a direct control and interest in every phase of the 4 or 6 organs that leave the factory in an average year.

#### Health News – Cancer Info – Part 3

Cancer is complex and mysterious, which makes it difficult to understand and predict.

Cancer can cause many symptoms. If any symptoms or issues do not get better after a few weeks, get medical evaluation. Often, cancer does not cause pain, so do not wait for pain before seeing a doctor to guide your care and ease concerns.

**Diagnosis**: A biopsy to remove tissue for testing by a pathologist provides important information and final diagnosis; it determines the grade of the cancer cells. *Tumor grade* is not the same thing as cancer stage. Grade looks at cells (how normal or abnormal they look), stage refers to how large a cancer tumor is and how far the cancer has spread. How cancer is diagnosed: https://www.cancer.gov/about-cancer/diagnosis-staging/diagnosis



Knowing the stage of cancer helps doctors (1) plan the **best treatment**, (2) understand how serious the cancer status is and survival chances, (3) identify clinical trials that may be treatment options.

Genetics: Some types of cancer run in families, but most cancers are not clearly linked to the genes we inherit. Gene changes that start in a single cell over the course of a person's life cause most cancers. Inherited or family cancer syndrome is caused by an abnormal gene passed down. Only 5-10% of all cancers are known to be strongly linked to mutations inherited. News reports related to the BRCA1 or BRCA2 gene are well publicized in relationship to breast, ovarian, pancreatic and prostate cancer risk. 10% of all melanoma cases have a family history of the disease. Family lifestyles & environment can also impact risk, rather than gene mutation, such as family history of smoking and lung cancer. https://www.cancer.gov/about-cancer/ causes-prevention/genetics

Increased knowledge of genes is providing increased guidance of treatment. A tumor is caused by DNA changes that cause cells to grow out of control. Doctors can test some tumor's DNA to find out which genes are active. They have discovered that knowing the set of genes that are active provides important clues to which treatment is most likely to be effective. i.e. "MammaPrint" has been developed for additional info about breast cancer. It checks 70 genes in order to classify tumors as low or high risk of recurrence. (GLSC)

Persons & families impacted by cancer learn new info and can benefit from a wide range of support systems provided by their treatment center and the community.

The Gathering Place - our local cancer support organization has helpful programs for all whose life is impacted by cancer. Their free programming is helpful during all phases including adjusting to changes that accompany the end of treatment. <u>https://touchedbycancer.org/</u> Share your prayer requests and concerns so you can receive faith support also!



#### Mission Trip Indianapolis, Indiana June 18-23, 2023

Four CRLC youth (Hannah Boulton, Zach Toghill, Alex Emrick, Ben Wells) and Paul Travaglianti did a mission trip to Indianapolis, Indiana on June 18-22, 2023. The program is coordinated by a company called YouthWorks, a Christian based organization based in Minnesota.

Upon arrival, the three coordinators (plus a Youthworks District Manager) greeted our group as

well as the youth and adults from two other churches, one from Bettendorf, Iowa and the other from Milwaukee, Wisconson. In total, there were about 15 youth and 8 adult leaders.

The CRLC youth attended the 8 AM service which concluded with a sendoff by Paul Travaglianti and prayer by Pastor Randy. Then we all traveled the to Indianapolis.

Each day began with breakfast followed by devotions (private time for each youth and adult to reflect on a theme of the day) and then off for the work day. Our youth were able to meet the youth from the other churches because we worked together on a project or the CRLC youth were with another church.

The groups did a variety of tasks including

<u>Dathouse</u>: This organization is in the Bates-Hendricks neighborhood on the near south side of Indianapolis. Their goal is to be leaders in healthy community development and it is in this spirit that they operate The Lincoln Center which offers an after school kids program, various community business developments and a variety of other community programs. Some of the businesses include the Lincoln Lane Coffee Company, The Loft and Dat Laundry.

<u>Gleaners Food Bank</u> – This is the largest food bank in Indianapolis and is part of the national network of food banks that fight Hunger in America. They see over 20,000 volunteers a year and their vision is to put out food for every table and empower every future. Gleaners is a drive-thru distribution center. We held check in households to know their food allotment, bagged can goods and rice, vegetables, snacks and loaded vehicles. We had a training session and worked for five hours in which 691 cars were loaded.

#### Wheeling Mission Shelter - This organization offers temporary shelter

for men while providing other services such as case management and assessment, medical services, lodging, chapel services and elective classes. We worked in the kitchen area and stocked goods, cleaned, prepared dinner and served lunch to 115 men in 30 minutes.

<u>Holv Family Shelter</u> – This organization is working to combat homelessness in Indianapolis by offering a thirty-day emergency shelter specializing in families. Each family is assigned their own room or suite, a caseworker who helps to get them back on their feet, and various other life skill classes and resources. They host an average of 22 families per night and run various other programs throughout the year, all which continue to support their mission to fix urban homelessness through building families up and providing long term solutions. We sorted donations, cleaned and helped with indoor and outdoor projects.

After a much-needed shower, everyone had a little free time. Every day, there was an activity such as admissions to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, dinner in a local church and time in the city, a scavenger hunt and church service at the church were we stayed followed by outdoor free time.

The theme of the week was "You Are Here". Each night, about 8:30 PM, the Youth Works staff hosted a group time to talk about the day, worship through songs and hearing a staff members story, talk about highs of the day followed by a Christ-centered talk. This was followed by church group time where we met with only our youth to talk about the day. Lights out at 10:30 PM.

Thursday's worship featured a foot washing. The Youth Works staff began by washing the feet of the adult leaders and said a prayer. Then Paul washed the feet of the CRLC youth followed by a prayer. Following the Adult prayer, the youth also prayed for each individual. A very emotional evening to say the least.

The connections made with the youth, the adult leaders and the Youthworks staff is truly amazing when you consider that you are only together for five days. The youth will be talking about their experience during one of the adult classes in the fall.


