Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us." (Romans 8:31-34)

Understanding ourselves. Understanding even God.

I don't believe that any one person on this journey in life ever arrives at a complete understanding of things. The apostle Paul, in the great love chapter of Corinthians, sums it up by saying that "now we see in a mirror dimly." When things occur in this life that we don't expect, when things happen that challenge our notions of things and people, we are often left to ponder the unknown, and even seek to figure out the incomprehensible.

I believe part of the Good News of the Gospel, is that we are not charged with trying to figure it all out. Even Jesus' very closest disciples, after spending three years with him, did not understand what was coming next. We, in our course of life, will not either. Sometimes this can be exciting because we don't know what is around the corner, other times it can be challenging because what does happen can cross our boundary of expectation. But again, the Good News of the Gospel reminds, and directs us, to a God of unconditional love, a God whose compassion and promise for humanity remains steadfast and strong, no matter what humanity does.

For those who are in mourning, for those who are amid great struggles, for those facing challenging decisions and obstacles, we are reminded of a God who turns darkness into light, a God who lifts the burdens of the heavy laden, a God who claims us fully into our Savior's loving care and can give us a peace that passes all understanding. *See you in worship*,

Celebrating the 50th Anniversary of the Schlicker/Holkamp Organ 1973-2023

I'm pleased to announce that I have commissioned an organ partita on the hymn tune ENGELBERG, in celebration of the 50^{th} Anniversary of the CRCL organ. A partita is a

musical composition consisting of a theme and variations.

Charles V. Stanford (1852-1924) composed ENGELBERG as a setting for William W. How's "For All the Saints". The tune was published in the 1904 edition of *Hymns Ancient and Modern* with no less than six different musical settings. A prodigious and energetic composer and conductor, he composed before he was ten and as an undergraduate became organist at Trinity College, Cambridge. He studied in Leipzig and Berlin with Carl Reinecke and Friedrich Keil. He taught at the Royal College of Music from 1883 and at Cambridge from 1887, in both positions until the end of his life. Besides being director of the Cambridge Musical Society from 1872 until 1893, the London Bach Choir from 1885 until 1902, and the Leeds Festival from 1901 until 1910, he wrote a book Musical *Composition* (1911) and, with Cecil Forsyth, a *History of Music* (1916). We have almost two hundred musical compositions from him in almost all musical forms, including church music. His most lasting influence was a demanding teacher of composition whose students included Ralph Vaughan Williams, Gustav Holst, Walford Davies, and Herbert Howells.

ENGELBERG is an attractive, energetic melody with many ascending motives, designed for unison singing with no pauses between stanzas. It is associated with the hymn "When in Our Music God is Glorified" (ELW 851). John Wilson—who quietly, behind the scenes, and with scholarly care and imaginative insight made many constructive contributions to hymnody in the twentieth century—"wanted a hymn for a Festival of Praise or Choir Anniversary to Stanford's tune ENGELBERG." He asked Fred Pratt Green to write it. This hymn that emerged from Wilson's request, as many commentators have noted, is unusual. Green managed to mention music—which is usually disastrous because it points a hymn in the wrong direction—in such a way that its translucent vocation in this world is carried out: to glorify God by giving us an "Alleluia" to sing. The original alliterative first line point to this and sets out the hymn's whole structure: "When in our music God is glorified."

The composer of this organ partita is Dr. John A. Behnke (b. 1953), Emeritus Professor of Music, Concordia University, Mequon, Wisconsin, where for 29 years he taught organ, church music and directed The Alleluia Ringers, Concordia's touring handbell choir. Dr. Behnke is also a frequent organ recitalist, handbell clinician, and festival director. He was honored in December of 1993 being named "MVP" Most Valuable Player in the Milwaukee area by Milwaukee Sentinel music critic, Nancy Raabe. In May of 1994 he was named Concordia's "Faculty Laureate." He has also received an ASCAP Composers Award every year since 1998. In March of 2004, he was selected by the Milwaukee Journal-Sentinel as one of the "10 Beautiful Minds" of scholars who help make Milwaukee a brighter place. In March of 2009, he was selected as one of 103 notable people who live and work in Ozaukee County, Wisconsin. A 1974 graduate of Concordia-River Forest, IL. he received his M. Mus. in Church Music and Organ from Northwestern University, Evanston, IL. in 1978. His D. Mus. was awarded to him in 1984 by Northwestern University where he was elected into the Alpha Chapter of Pi Kappa Lambda, a National Honorary Music Society

From August 1978 to July 1979 Dr. Behnke studied at the Westphalian Church Music Institute in Herford, W. Germany, where he passed the "A" Exam in Organ with the grade of "1-Excellent".

"I consider myself a "church musician."", says Dr. Behnke. I began playing the organ in high school and I'm still playing today. I love conducting a bell or a vocal choir. And I enjoy composing and arranging having over 500 handbell, choral, and organ compositions in print with eighteen different publishers in the United States, Germany, Hong Kong and Taiwan, including my own label, JAB John Behnke PUBLISHING.

Currently, Dr. Behnke is organist at Trinity Lutheran Church, Port Charlotte, FL and a Board Member of the AGO Sarasota/ Manatee Chapter.

This musical composition is written specifically for the 50th anniversary of the Schlicker/Holtkamp organ at Christ the Redeemer Lutheran Church. It is my hope to place a copy of the music in the time capsule. The premier of this piece is planned for the 50th Anniversary organ recital later this year.

Thank you, Dr. Behnke for graciously accepting our request and creating music that will celebrate this 50th anniversary in a very special way.

In the words of the hymn writer:

Let every instrument be tuned for praise; let all rejoice who have a voice to raise; and may God give us faith to sing always: Alleluia!

Readings for October

October 1-Pentecost 18

Jesus' parable about two sons who don't do what they say reveals surprises in the reign of God. In the reading from Ezekiel the people claim the ways of the Lord are unfair, while God offers repentance and new life. Paul urges us to look to Christ as a model of humility, putting the interests of others above our own. Nourished by the broken bread and shared cup, we offer our lives for the sake of our needy world.

October 8-Pentecost 19

In today's gospel reading, Jesus tells a vineyard parable, which serves as an image of Israel, the prophets' mission, and Christ's death. For Christians, the vineyard also speaks of God's love poured out in the blood of Christ, given to us for the forgiveness of sin. Grafted onto Christ the vine at baptism, we are nourished with wine and bread so that we may share Christ's sufferings and know the power of his resurrection.

October 15-Pentecost 20

In Isaiah we are given a vision of the great feast to come, when God will wipe away death forever. In Jesus' parable about a great banquet, those invited do not come, so the invitation is extended to others. In our liturgy God spreads a table before us. Even amid anxiety and hardship we rejoice in the peace of God which surpasses all understanding. With great joy we feast at the table of the Lord, and we go forth to share the wonderful invitation with others hungering and thirsting for the abundant life of God.

October 22-Pentecost 21

In today's first reading God uses the Gentile ruler Cyrus to accomplish divine purposes. When the Pharisees try to trap Jesus, he tells them to give the emperor what belongs to him and to God what belongs to God. To gather for worship reminds us that our ultimate allegiance is to God rather than to any earthly authority. Created in the image of God, we offer our entire selves in the service of God and for the sake of the world.

October 29-reformation Sunday

Rooted in the past and growing into the future, the church must always be reformed in order to live out the love of Christ in an ever-changing world. We celebrate the good news of God's grace, that Jesus Christ sets us free every day to do this life-transforming work. Trusting in the freedom given to us in baptism, we pray for the church, that Christians will unite more fully in worship and mission.

"Be merciful to me, LORD, for I am in distress; my eyes grow weak with sorrow, my soul and body with grief." (Psalm 31:9)

This Psalm gives voice to the anguish and struggle experienced due to trauma.

Trauma: "a deeply distressing or disturbing experience." Stress from trauma is triggered by a terrifying event – either experiencing it *or* witnessing it. *Few people can go through life without encountering some kind of* <u>trauma</u>. Unlike ordinary hardships, traumatic events tend to be **sudden & unpredictable**, involve a **serious threat to life**—like bodily injury or death—and feel **beyond a person's control**. Most important, events are traumatic to the degree that they undermine a person's <u>sense of safety</u> in the world & create a sense that catastrophe could strike at any time. Parental loss in childhood, physical violence, sexual assault, military combat experiences, the *unexpected loss of a loved one* are common traumatic events. Consider how a **community** experiences a natural disaster; our **country** shared the stress of the 9/11 attack & our **world** the covid pandemic crisis. "You alone, O God, make me lie down in safety" (Psalm 4:8)

Consider the impact on a family that experienced a car crash ~ magnify that with the death or permanent injury of self or a family member! Studies have shown that "adverse childhood experiences" (ACES), can impact long term health & wellness. 
Trauma responses: Severe anxiety, nightmares, flashbacks and uncontrollable thoughts about the event may occur. Most people who go through a single traumatic event may have temporary difficulty adjusting & coping but improve with time & good self-care. Getting timely help & support can aid & prevent normal acute stress reactions from getting worse and developing into PTSD. <u>https://www.mayoclinic.org/diseases-conditions/post-traumatic-stress-disorder/expert-answers/post-traumatic-stress/faq-20057756</u>

Possessive, controlling behavior is what domestic violence is all about. Children should know & understand that force, coercion & control have no place in interactions. Home should be a place where children observe & experience respect. Violence in any form-physical, sexual, psychological or verbal-is sinful; often it is a crime as well. Importantly, churches take a public stand & participate in community efforts to address this social justice issue. It matters greatly to the faithful of the church what we say or *don't* say about painful, personal & persistent experiences of abuse.

How do we as God's people respond? Seek to reflect Christ's light & love, as people of hope who acknowledge the challenges of trauma and provide support! "Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others." (Philippians 2:4)


