

O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright

I'd like to share some information on the Epiphany Hymn "O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright". You will hear two settings of this chorale in worship on January 7, 2024. It is my hope that you learn something new! Enjoy!

This hymn came to be known as the "Queen of Chorales" and its partner "Wake, awake, for night is flying" as the "King of Chorales". Both hymns and their tunes are by Philipp Nicolai (1556-1608), who included them in his *Frewden-Speigel dess ewigen Lebens* (1599)—"joyful mirror of eternal life."

"O Morning Star" is based on Psalm 45, with allusions to the jewel, jasper, and pearls of Revelation 21:11, 19, and 21, the Alpha, Omega, and Morning Star of Revelation 22:13 and 16. Much more than that, however, the hymn's images pull together God's love n Christ through word and sacraments in a joyful song that is at once cosmic and intensely personal. Nicolai kept the "objective" character of God's loving action but heightened the "subjective" accent of our loving response. A whole gestalt about God's powerful action and a responsively potent Christian life is present here. The poetic shape of the poem itself suggests this. If you center its lines—in German or English—and lay them out according to their rhyme scheme, the outline of a chalice emerges:

O Morning Star, how fair and bright! You shine with God's own truth and light, aglow with grace and mercy! Of Jacob's line, King David's son, our Lord and Savior, you have won our hearts to serve you only! Lowly, holy! Great and glorious, all victorious, rich in blessing! Rule and might o'er all possessing!

That may have been Nicolai's intent, given the all-encompassing character of the Lord's supper.

The German text had seven stanzas. The first letter of each stanza formed an acrostic in honor of Nicolai's friend and student Wilhelm Ernst, who died in 1598: WEGVUHZW, **Wilhelm Ernst, Graf und Herr zu Waldeck** (Wilhelm Ernst, Count and Lord of Waldeck). *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* prints an English version of six stanzas.

This hymn stimulated clones, variations, and new creations in German followed by various English translations of them. The text in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* is largely the one prepared by the Inter-Lutheran Commission on Worship for *Lutheran Book of Worship* and shows some influences from Catherine Winkworth.

Nicolai was born near Waldeck, Germany, studied first at Erfurt, graduated from Wittenburg in 1579 and received a DD there in 1594. In 1588 he was the pastor at Altwildungen and in 1596 at Unna in Wesfphalia. In 1597-1598 the plague struck Unna. Thirteen hundred people died in a six-month period. Nicolai's house overlooked the cemetery where he conducted the interments of as many as thirty funerals a day. Turning to Augustine's "City of God", he wrote "O Morning Star" and "Wake, awake"—which is one more instance in the church's history where intense pain and suffering produced remarkable creations. In 1601 Nicolai was called to St. Catherine's Church in Hamburg. He died seven years later, remembered as an eloquent preacher whom some people likened to Chrysostom.

WIE SCHON LEUCHTET is a jubilant tune. A common musical coinage (where individual crafting was regarded as part of the communal whole) is at work for this time in that it may have been adapted by Nicolai from the tune for Psalm 100 in Wolff Kophel's *Psalter* (1538). The rhythmic version given here is the congregational original and fits the character of the text as well as congregational singing.

READINGS FOR JANUARY

JANUARY 7

Our re-creation in baptism is an image of the Genesis creation, where the Spirit of God moved over the waters. Both Mark's gospel and the story in Acts make clear that it is the Spirit's movement that distinguishes Jesus' baptism from John's. The Spirit has come upon us as upon Jesus and the Ephesians, calling us God's beloved children and setting us on Jesus' mission to re-create the world in the image of God's vision of justice and peace.

Genesis 1:1-5 Psalm 29 Acts 19:1-7 Mark 1:4-11

JANUARY 14

All the baptized have a calling in God's world. God calls not just pastors and deacons but also the youngest child, like Samuel. The story of the calling of Nathanael plays with the idea of place. Nathanael initially dismisses Jesus because he comes from Nazareth. But where we come from isn't important; it's where—or rather whom—we come to. Jesus refers to Jacob, who had a vision in a place he called "the house of God, and . . . the gate of heaven" (Gen. 28:17). Jesus says he himself is the place where Nathanael will meet God.

JANUARY 21

As we continue through the time after Epiphany, stories of the call to discipleship show us the implications of our baptismal calling to show Christ to the world. Jesus begins proclaiming the good news and calling people to repentance right after John the Baptist is arrested for preaching in a similar way. Knowing that John was later executed, we see at the very outset the cost of discipleship. Still, the two sets of brothers leave everything they have known and worked for all their lives to follow Jesus and fish for people.

JANUARY 28

In Deuteronomy God promises to raise up a prophet like Moses, who will speak for God; in Psalm 111 God shows the people the power of God's works. For the church these are ways of pointing to the unique authority people sensed in Jesus' actions and words. We encounter that authority in God's word, around which we gather, the word that prevails over any lesser spirit that would claim power over us, freeing us to follow Jesus. 1 Samuel 3:1-10 [11-20] Psalm 139:1-6, 13-18 1 Corinthians 6:12-20 John 1:43-51

Health News

May God Bless you in the New Year. Resolution in the New Year: what if we each tried to improve the emotional climate of our personal world? We lament that our society & thinking is *self-centered, rude & disrespectful*. The pervading attitude that thinks: "I don't like ...", "I'm not comfortable with - - - poor/rich people, old people, slow/ fast drivers, people of different ethnic or racial background, people with piercings, weird hair, etc." and it is my right to let them know! Such selfishness in attitudes is a challenging way of thinking which can easily slip into all areas of our lives – showing itself in our interactions with family, strangers & even within the church community.

"To watch over mouth and tongue is to keep out of trouble." (Proverb 21:23)

We all have impulses to do things & say things that aren't helpful & kind to others. It may not be realistic to expect to stop having these impulses/thoughts, but it is important to *stop yourself from acting* on every impulse you have. Healthy people have internalized the "<u>stop and think</u>" message & use it to make choices about their actions. Impulse control can be learned.

"Let the wise also hear and gain in learning, and the discerning acquire skill." (Proverbs 1:5)

Avoiding rude responses & behaving in a respectful way is modeling Christ-like responses in our world. It is basic good communication to *all* from preschoolers to seniors. Respect is an attitude. <u>Be positive</u> - Don't embarrass, insult, or make fun of others. Compliment others. <u>Be Trusting</u> - Let others make choices and take responsibility. <u>Be fair</u> - Listen to the other side of the story before reaching a conclusion. <u>Be polite</u> - Use "please" & "thank you". Knock before entering a room. <u>Be reliable</u> - Keep promises. Show that you mean what you say. <u>Be a good listener</u> - Give your full attention. <u>Be caring</u> - Show concern for people, animals & the environment.

(1) Model it: If you want others to do it, you have to do it too.

(2) **Expect it:** When your expectations are reasonably high, others rise to the occasion.

(3) Teach it: Give children the tools they need to show you respect.

(4) **Praise it:** When you see or hear children using respectful language and making respectful choices, recognize it and praise them for making positive, respectful decisions.

(5) **Discuss it:** Pick out times when you see other people using respectful or disrespectful language or behavior & discuss it.

(6) **Correct it:** Be strong, firm & direct when teaching respect. At the same time, be sure you are being respectful yourself while correcting the behavior.

(7) Acknowledge it: *Don't just let things slide!* Be sure to notice when respectful behavior is being exhibited & make sure to "call them out" on disrespectful behavior!

(8) <u>Understand</u> it: Children are growing & learning. But have you considered whether you may have picked up bad habits? Sometimes word choice & behavioral decisions are made because: "I'm tired," "I'm frustrated," or "I'm angry." Apology may be necessary.

(9) **Reinforce it:** Remind children of their good decisions so that they remember how it felt, the praise they received, and the overall experience of being respectful.

(10) **Reward it:** Respectful behavior should be something that children want to do without rewards.

"Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing." (1 Thes. 5:11)






