#### **Beneath the Cross of Jesus**



The treasured traditions of Easter—baskets, bonnets, lilies, sunrise services, passion plays and more—infuse our celebration of the season with meaning and glowing memories. And in ways you may not realize, they point to the resurrection of Christ and our hope of life beyond the grave. In his book *Stories Behind the Traditions and* 

Songs of Easter, Ace Collins reveals the events and backgrounds that shaped the best-loved customs and songs of Easter.

Elizabeth Clephane was born on June 18, 1830, the third daughter of a Scottish lawman. She was never a strong child, prone to long bouts of sickness and therefore often homebound. In spite of her inability to move through life as freely as she would like, Elizabeth had a strong, sweet spirit that deeply touched the community of Melrose. So, in the midst of their hard lives, the people of the village looked upon Elizabeth as an inspiration. She showed that even in the worst of times, joy and wonder can be found in each new day and that every breath is a blessing for which to give thanks.

Taking Clephane's bleak life into account, it is amazing that Elizabeth was able to maintain her positive attitude. Not only was she constantly fighting illness, but her father died when she was just a girl. After his death, times were tough for the family. Even finding enough to eat was often an insurmountable task, and affording medical care for Clephane was simply beyond the family's means. But the fragile girl never complained. In bad times and good, she remained a shining beacon for her siblings as well as an inspiration to those who observed her from afar.

When bouts of illness confined her to the family's tiny home, Clephane turned her attention to reading. Like many from her country, she enthusiastically consumed the works of local hero Sir Walter Scott, but, unlike few outside the clergy, she also spent hours each day reading the Bible. It is hardly surprising that by the time she was in her mid-twenties, her knowledge of English literature was exceeded only by her understanding of the Good Book. The latter, much more than the former, influenced everything she did. Many claimed they could actually feel Christ's love in her gentle touch.

Clephane's easy smile lit up every room she entered. In fact, most in Melrose called her not by her given name, but by her nickname, "Sunbeam". And, on those days when she was healthy enough to leave her home, it was as "Sunbeam" that the slight woman made her rounds sharing food and clothing with the poor as well as tending the sick and elderly. Doing these menial chores brought her more happiness than anything in her sparse life.

While it is impossible to say if Clephane felt a foreshadowing of her own early passing, there can be no doubt that she well understood the fragile nature of life. She had ministered to the gravely ill of all ages. She had watched her father die in the prime of his life. She had seen children taken just after birth and had held the hands of the elderly as they drew their final breaths. Just as she knew hunger, despair, and poverty, she knew death. Thus, as she reached out to those whose every moment was filled with pain and suffering, she felt driven to share the story of faith that made her life so meaningful and her own pain so meaningless. In that way she transcended being "Sunbeam" and became a beam of light from God's own Son.

By 1868, Clephane's body was further weakened by numerous bouts with the flu, her vision was starting to fail, and she looked much older that her thirty-eight years. Nevertheless, though her back was bent and her frame was rail thin, her smile was as quick as ever, and there was still a sparkle in her eyes. Yet, though still a young woman, Clephane had to have known she was near death's door. It was probably for that reason she seemed so intent on making each new day count for something special. Even when she was confined to her bed, she seemed to be constantly looking for ways to leave behind the essence of her faith to future generations. Like her hero Scott, she would touch ethers with timeless verse.

One afternoon, as she laid aside her well-worn Bible and picked up a pencil, Clephane considered several essential elements of her faith. The first was that Christ was her rock and had saved and delivered her from the travails of an existence filled with sin and temptation. After all, she had seen many unhappy souls who had given in to temptation only to be tortured by it. Through faith she had escaped that fate. Next, she considered what the suffering Christ had endured in order to give her the blessings of a forgiven life. This led her to consider the unworthiness of all people, including herself. That Jesus had died for her, when he could have chosen not to, humbled her beyond measure. She felt awed by God's grace.

#### Beneath the Cross of Jesus—continued



As Clephane thought of Christ's suffering on the cross, she turned from the horrid scene to the results of that painful death. Because of the cross, she had been given the keys to God's kingdom. She had received the joy and comfort of having him with her during bad times and good and had come to appreciate the promise of eternal life. Hence, the cross was in fact not a dark moment in time, but one of the brightest in human history. It

was the conduit to experiencing the eternal love of God.

Opening her Bible, Clephane read Matthew 27:36-37: "And sitting down they watched him there; and set up over his head his accusation written, THIS IS JESUS THE KING OF THE JEWS." These were not new verses to her. She had read them hundreds of times. But today this Scripture brought her the greatest inspiration she had ever known in her short life. Elizabeth was transported to the cross and had a vision for a poem. In only a few years, the five verses she wrote would become one of the most important songs the church would use throughout Lent and on Easter. Yet on this day, the words Clephane penned were just a vehicle the woman employed to spell out what Christ meant to her. This poem was for her eyes only; it was for her heart, and it was to anchor her faith.

When she finished writing "Beneath the Cross of Jesus," Clephane did nothing with it. Satisfied that her writing had brought her closer to her Lord, she filed her latest work away with seven other Christian poems. These eight poems were discovered after Clephane died, and for a short while they were shared with just family and friends. Initially no one thought of taking them to the world. Then, in 1872, a family member submitted them to the Scottish Presbyterian periodical *Family Treasury*. The editor published Clephane's poems one at a time under the title *Breathing on the Borders*. The first printed was "Beneath the Cross of Jesus", and no writer credit was given. As Clephane did not want to bask in the spotlight, she would have probably approved of not being spotlighted as the poem's writer. This humble woman would have wanted readers to dwell not on her often sad and short life but rather on the life, death, and resurrection of her Savior.

It is not known whether composer Frederick Charles Maker first saw Clephane's poem in the *Family Treasury* or if he spotted it when it was later reprinted in a British newspaper. Whichever is the case, when the forty-year-old composer read the words to "Beneath the Cross of Jesus", he was deeply moved. Maker, an organist, a professor of music at Clifton College and the conductor of the Bristol Free Church Choir, felt this dynamic testimony could reach a much larger audience if it could be sung. Therefore, Maker created a musical score for the poem and entitled his new melody "St. Christopher". As it was written during an era when modern music was being accepted into English worship, this coupling of verse and melody quickly made "Beneath the Cross of Jesus" one of the most popular hymns in British church history. When contrasted against Elizabeth Clephane's weak body and humble existence, the song's power and majesty take on even deeper meaning.

When first anonymously published in *Family Treasury*, Elizabeth Clephane's poems created so much reader feedback that Reverend W. Arnot, the periodical's editor, felt moved to share something of the writer's personality and character. He wrote, "These lines express the experiences, the hopes, and the longings of a young Christian lately released. Written on the very edge of life, with the better land fully in view of faith, they seem to us footsteps printed on the sands of time, where these sands touch the ocean of Eternity. These footprints of one whom the Good Shepherd led through the wilderness into rest, may, with God's blessing, contribute to comfort and direct succeeding pilgrims." And so they have!

Almost a century and a half later, Elizabeth Clephane's words have done more than even Arnot could have imagined. They have led people not just to view the cross but also to understand its meaning. This frail woman's example continues to touch lost souls with the glory of the cross, and "Sunbeam" became a ray of spiritual light for the world.

#### READINGS FOR MARCH

#### March 3

The third covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the central one of Israel's history: the gift of the law to those God freed from slavery. The commandments begin with the statement that because God alone has freed us from the powers that oppressed us, we are to let nothing else claim first place in our lives. When Jesus throws the merchants out of the temple, he is defending the worship of God alone and rejecting the ways commerce and profit-making can become our gods. The Ten Commandments are essential to our baptismal call: centered first in God's liberating love, we strive to live out justice and mercy in our communities and the world.

Exodus 20:1-17 Psalm 19 1 Corinthians 1:18-25 John 2:13-22

#### March 10

The fourth of the Old Testament promises providing a baptismal lens this Lent is the promise God makes to Moses: those who look on the bronze serpent will live. In today's gospel Jesus says he will be lifted up on the cross like the serpent, so that those who look to him in faith will live. When we receive the sign of the cross in baptism, that cross becomes the sign we can look to in faith for healing, for restored relationship to God, for hope when we are dying.

#### March 17

God promises Jeremiah that a "new covenant" will be made in the future: a covenant that will allow all the people to know God by heart. The church sees this promise fulfilled in Christ, who draws all people to himself when he is lifted up on the cross. Our baptismal covenant draws us to God's heart through Christ and draws God's love and truth into our hearts. We join together in worship, sharing in word, song, and meal, and leave strengthened to share God's love with all the world.

#### March 24

This week, the center of the church's year, is one of striking contrasts: Jesus rides into Jerusalem surrounded by shouts of glory, only to be left alone to die on the cross, abandoned by even his closest friends. Mark's gospel presents Jesus in his complete human vulnerability: agitated, grieved, scared, forsaken. Though we lament Christ's suffering and all human suffering, we also expect God's salvation: in the wine and bread, Jesus promises that his death will mark a new covenant with all people. We enter this holy week thirsty for the completion of God's astonishing work.

#### March 31

Christ is risen! Jesus is alive, and God has swallowed up death forever. With Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome, we may feel astonished and confused, unsure of what to make of the empty tomb. But this is why we gather: to proclaim, witness, praise, and affirm the liberating reality of Christ's death and resurrection. In word and feast, we celebrate God's unending love, and depart to share this good news with all the world. Alleluia!

#### **Health News**

"Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give him will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (John 4:13). Water holds a sacred place in our relationship with God. During Lent, consider "Living Water" through which God refreshes our bodies and our souls. Water presents a place of solace as it acts as a natural mirror to surrounding landscape.

Water is a vital source of life! Contaminated water is no longer a source of life but rather a means of death. Water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) are crucial to human health. 2 billion people lack a safe, sanitary and private place to go #1 and #2 today. Over four billion people live without safely managed sanitation in their communities, and three billion do not have access to basic hand washing facilities. Times of water supply issues such as water main breaks, plumbing problems, or drought can bring us to our knees in prayer, reminding us that *all life is in God's hands*. Despite all our technological advantages & wealth, we don't have the power & control we like to think is ours. Take a moment to pause and think about how our lives rely upon having the water we need the impact of our use & waste of water upon the world and those who don't have access to clean water.

#### What does water do for us physically?

- Removes waste products effectively
- Assists in digestion and metabolism
- Helps regulate our body temperature
- Lubricates our joints
- Assists in breathing
- Helps maintain our fluid balance
- Helps with weight reduction



Our loving God has provided living water for our souls. Without this living water, we are spiritually dead. Refreshing water is a symbol for life, physically & spiritually. In the Bible, the saving grace of God is imaged in the abundance of life-giving water. Take seriously the connection between life & water ~ seeking God's will & wisdom in use & protection of this resource. Water, life and God's grace intertwine as a clear reminder not to separate faith from what we do in our daily lives, even turning on the faucet.

#### What does the Living Water do for us?

- Reduces the power of sin in our lives (1 John 3:6)
- Helps us to 'digest' and use God's word (John 14:26)
- Reduces the 'weight' of life's burdens (Matthew 11:28)
- Blesses in us God's living Spirit (Genesis 2:7)
- Warms our life with joy (1 John 5:19)

Water, with the word, creates new life. This baptismal promise—with water and the word—brings new life to all of us. It is a promise that begins back at the very beginning of creation, travels throughout Scripture, ties into our lives, and even goes with us unto death & the life to come.



#### Hello From Redeemer!!!

YES! WE ARE STILL HERE AND SUPPORTING OUR NEIGHBORS!!!

It has been quite a two-year period. Redeemer has adapted many ways to keep our workers and friends receiving food safely.

Those of you who have not been in the basement multipurpose room should know it is no longer where we host people waiting to receive food. However, the room has become the main food-packing area. It has given us space for storage and to pack bags. People receiving food must wait in line outside. When volunteers know the family size, the food is carried upstairs to the waiting recipients. Luckily, we have our own helpful workers and an extraordinary group from Friends for Life (three days a week) who do a large part of the carrying up the stairs!

Clothing, small items, and books are arranged outside the main church doors on clothing racks and stacked on the porch steps. Our neighbors can look through the items and take home several.

On Mondays, we still receive our weekly delivery from the Cleveland Food Bank. We have lost many helpers, due to aging, who can move tons of food from the pallets to storage. If you know anyone who would like to volunteer to help with this, meet us on Mondays at 1:00 p.m. We would greatly appreciate the extra help. Finally, we are very excited to share that we have purchased, for a small price, the plot of land next to our building. We hope this spring to have a cement pad put in to help with safe food delivery unloading of trucks out of the street.

We partnered with the Hunger Network and Food Bank on Thursdays for a Food Rescue program that provides lots of fresh produce and bread for the neighbors. Giant Eagle, Heinen's, and Panera continue to support the Center with bread brought by volunteers from local congregations. New retail stores supporting the Center are Walmart and Lucky's Market, providing a variety of food donations weekly. We also appreciate food donations from many of you! With your support and the support of multiple congregations in Greater Cleveland more than 300 families received holiday food bags and parents were provided over 800 Christmas gifts for their children.

Concordia Lutheran Ministries grants have purchased more tents, picnic tables, and benches. The tents protect the community from the sun or rain, while the benches and tables provide outdoor seating. These items are for several outdoor events: a carnival, the summer program, a Community Meal, and Babies Care Cupboard. The Babies Care Cupboard has had speakers talk about the importance of reading to or with their children, fire safety, and the sun's effect on the skin Grant funds helped purchase Kitchen Fire Suppressant aerosol cans and sunscreen to give away to participating families

Divinity Lutheran Church hosted, this summer, an outdoor craft and lunch. In the fall, Divinity hosted a long-awaited senior tea. The 2024 Epiphany party was thrown by the members of St. Paul [Westlake] and the Westlake / Bay Village Rotary Club. This annual Epiphany party shares the story of The Three Kings' visit to Jesus. The custom is to put grass in a shoe box to feed the King's carnel and place it under their bed. In the morning, the child receives small gifts left by the kings. For this reason, we gift each child in the neighborhood a shoe box filled with small gifts for their age.

Another project this year, being done by St. Paul (Berea), is to install new ceiling tiles and lighting in the Center. Three rooms have been completed, and we can already see the difference! Thank you for your time and skills.

Diane has needed to be away from Redeemer for family concerns. Keely Zellmer and Annita Lugo have stepped up to handle the Center. If you should need to contact the Center please feel free to reach out to them.


