THE PARKING LOT FUNDRAISER!



At the 2023 Annual Congregational meeting not only did the congregation pass a 2024 Mission Investment plan but we also approved funding for a major re-asphalting of the parking lot and new concrete work on the driveway apron. With existing funds, the church is going to pay for 75% of this project. We are

hoping to raise the additional 25% from the congregation. Therefore, in general rounded numbers this translates to a goal of raising \$25,000 from the congregation. The good news is that we have already received monies for the project since our congregational meeting, so we are already on our way.

Added Bonus: For anyone who makes a donation for the new parking lot – Pastor Randy will deliver a chunk of the old parking lot asphalt that you can keep as a special Lutheran keepsake!

At this writing we are more than 25% there for our 25K goal! Thank you!!

The work on the parking lot has begun! The drain tile will be installed first and then they will complete the resurfacing of the parking lot. Planned dates right now are the week of June 24th. Parking will be available at the Community Center next door. All this is subject to change if the weather does not cooperate.

Beginning May 29, 2024, we will use ELW Holy Communion Setting 10. This setting is based on familiar hymn tunes. I'd like to share some information on these tunes and I hope you enjoy singing this setting.



Kyrie: SOUTHWELL

SOUTHWELL, whose composer is unknown, is one of the earliest English Short Meter psalm tones. Its source is *The Psalmes of David in English Metre*, with Notes of Foure Partes set unto them (1579), collected and harmonized by William Damon (1540-1591), where it was the setting for Psalm 45. William Damon came to London in 1565, serving Lord Backhurst. He became one of the Queen's musicians in 1579.

Hymn of Praise: HYMN TO JOY

Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1827) is one of the few famous composers who wrote a hymn tune. HYMN TO JOY was composed for J.C.F. von Schiller's "Ode to Joy", which Beethoven set for a chorus in the fourth movement of his Ninth Symphony. Ludwig van Beethoven was born in Bonn, Germany, into a poor home where his father was abusive. He studied with Franz Joseph Haydn and other composers in Vienna. He wrote a prodigious amount of orchestral, chamber, piano, choral, and other music. Though from 1798 on he gradually lost his hearing, he nonetheless wrote some of his finest pieces after he was deaf.

Gospel Acclamation: UNSER HERRSCHER

UNSER HERRSCHER by Joachim Neander (1650-1680) is from *Alpha & Omega* (1680), where it went with the hymn that named it, "Unser Herrscher, unser Konig". Joachim Neander was born in Breman, Germany. He was educated at the Paedagogium in Bremen and studied at the Gymnasium Illustre. After tutoring in Heidelberg (1671-1673), he was the headmaster of the German Reformed Latin grammar school at Dusseldorf (1674-1679). In addition to hymn tunes, Neander wrote about sixty hymns, among them "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty". He has been called "the Paul Gerhardt of the German Reformed Church".

Sanctus: LAND OF REST

LAND OF REST is an American folk tune with roots in the ballads of northern England and Scotland. It was known throughout the Appalachians. A shape-note version of the tune was published in *The Sacred Harp* (1844) and titled NEW PROSPECT as the setting for "O land of rest! for thee I sigh."

Agnus Dei: TWENTY FOURTH

TWENTY-FOURTH appeared in John Wyeth's *Repository of Sacred Music* (1813). It is attributed to Lucius Chapin (1760-1842) a singing master in Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Kentucky. Ananias Davison, who compiled *Kentucky Harmony* (1916) may have been one of his students.

READINGS FOR JUNE

June 2

Deuteronomy makes clear that sabbath-keeping is meant for the welfare of all. God delivered the Israelites out of slavery, so they should observe this freedom with a day of rest. No one should work seven days a week; even slaves and foreigners should be able to rest. Yet human beings can turn even the most liberating religious practice into a life-destroying rule. Jesus does not reject sabbath-keeping, but defends its original life-enhancing meaning. Our worship and our religious way of life are to lead to restoration: the hungry being fed and the sick being healed.

June 9

A house divided against itself cannot stand. Jesus makes this observation in light of charges that he is possessed. He is possessed, not by a demon, but by the Holy Spirit. We who have received the Holy Spirit through baptism have been joined to Christ's death and resurrection and knit together in the body of Christ. Those with whom we sing and pray this day are Jesus' family. With them we go forth in peace to do the will of God.

JUNE 16

The mustard seed becomes a great shrub that shelters the birds, recalling ancient images of the tree of life. We'd expect a cedar or a sequoia, but Jesus finds the power of God better imaged in a tiny, no-account seed. It's not the way we expect divine activity to look. Yet the tree of life is here, in the cross around which we gather, the tree into which we are grafted through baptism, the true vine that nourishes us with its fruit in the cup we share. It may not appear all that impressive, but while nobody's looking it grows with a power beyond our understanding.

IUNE 23

Now is the acceptable time; now is the day of salvation! Now we are in the storm, the boat almost swamped; but Jesus is here now, and when we call him, he will calm the storm. Even the wind and waves listen to him as they would to their creator. We also listen to him and are called to believe in the power of God's word in him, a power greater than all that we fear.

June 30

A woman finds healing by touching Jesus' cloak, and a girl is restored to life when he takes her by the hand. In both cases a boundary is crossed: in Jesus' time the hemorrhaging woman was considered ritually unclean, polluting others by her touch, and anyone who touched a corpse also became unclean. In Mark's gospel Jesus breaks down barriers, from his first meal at a tax collector's house to his last breath on the cross as the temple curtain is torn in two. We dare to touch Jesus in our "uncleanness" and to live as a community that defines no one as an outsider.

"An intelligent mind acquires knowledge, and the ear of the wise seeks knowledge" (Proverbs 18:15).

Summertime safety - let's focus on severe weather safety. Sirens can be heard, alert messages are on TV, radio, phones, and computer tablets -thunderstorms are dangerous. They can produce storm-related deaths from flash flooding (the #1 killer), lightning & tornados. Every thunderstorm produces lightning. Most lightning victims survive, but often have long-term symptoms. Lightning strike victims carry no electrical charge but need care immediately!

To be prepared: Download an emergency alert app for your phone or sign up for a community home alert program. https://www.weather.gov/wrn/wea Traveling consider "Weather warnings on the go!" When traveling in Wisconsin we heard an emergency alert and stopped, later as we continued on the road, there were several semi-trucks that had blown off the road. Additionally, when visiting out of state we receive alerts to weather happening at home & where we are staying. Red Cross has a free emergency mobile app.

Before Thunderstorm & Lightning Prepare: http://www.ready.gov/thunderstorms-lightning

Build an emergency kit and make a family communications plan.

- Remove dead or rotting trees & branches that could fall and cause injury or damage during a severe thunderstorm.
- Postpone outdoor activities.
- 30/30 Lightning Safety Rule: Go indoors if, after seeing lightning, you cannot count to 30 before hearing thunder. Stay indoors for 30 minutes after hearing the last clap of thunder.
- Secure outdoor objects that could blow away or cause damage.
- Get inside a home, building, or hard top car (not a convertible). Although you may be injured if lightning strikes your car, you are much safer inside a vehicle than outside.
- Rubber-soled shoes & rubber tires provide NO protection from lightning. The steel frame of a hard-topped vehicle provides increased protection if you are not touching metal.
- Shutter windows & secure outside doors. Close window blinds, shades or curtains.

Unplug any electronic equipment well before the storm arrives.

Lightning: What You Need to Know

- NO PLACE outside is safe when thunderstorms are in the area!!
- If you hear thunder, lightning is close enough to strike you.

Indoor Lightning Safety

- Pay attention to alerts & warnings
- Avoid using electronic devices connected to an electrical outlet. Avoid watering water.
- Stay away from windows and doors and stay off porches. Do not lie on concrete floors, and do not lean against concrete walls.

Last Resort Outdoor Risk Reduction Tips

If you are caught outside with no safe shelter anywhere nearby the following actions may reduce your risk:

- Immediately get off elevated areas such as hills, mountain ridges or peaks. Never lie flat on the ground ground current danger.
- Never shelter under an isolated tree; never use a cliff or rocky overhang for shelter
- Immediately get out and away from ponds, lakes and other bodies of water
- Stay away from objects that conduct electricity (barbed wire fences, power lines, windmills, etc.)
- Turn around. Don't Drown! 6" of moving water can knock you down, and 1 foot can sweep your vehicle away.

More than 80% of lightning fatalities are men who did not seek shelter from an approaching storm, but instead kept on fishing, boating, golfing, biking, or working outdoors. BE SAFE- If you can hear thunder, even a distant rumble, lightning is close enough to strike you. Did you know? Commercial planes are struck by lightning an average of 1-2 times each year. They are designed to conduct electrical currents safely around the shell of the plane.

May you seek wisdom and peace from the Lord when you are faced with life's storms physical or emotional.



About Haven Home

In early 2024, The Haven Home pivoted to a housing program dedicated to pregnant and parenting women, with programming designed to restore familial relationships.

The primary objective of the <u>family maternity home</u> is to provide a safe and supportive environment for expectant mothers and new mothers who may not have access to adequate housing, medical care, or support during their pregnancy and the postpartum period. Our goal is to ensure that each mother, infant and their immediate families receive the best possible care and support to promote their health and well-being as individuals and a family unit.

Oasis Outreach Changes

Greetings in the name of Christ! I thank you for your genuine love, ongoing prayers, and financial support of Oasis!

I am writing to announce the new beginnings at Oasis as I leave my role as Executive Director, which I have served in for the last nineteen years. I have decided to accept the call to be pastor at two small ELCA congregations, in the greater Akron area. James Wright, my son, who has served Oasis for the past 13 years, will take over as Executive Director in May. Oasis will continue to serve children and their families in Akron. Small group and retreat experiences will continue out of the Oasis Healing House on the north side of Akron.

In a new outreach, Oasis is exploring how to reach youth in Akron Public Schools who are experiencing homelessness. At any given time 2000 students are identified as dealing with homelessness through Project Rise. Oasis staff will meet them through our partnership with Dare to Love More, located at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Akron.

Oasis will continue to be involved in Oasis Mission Development by providing financial and spiritual support to ELCA congregations. Currently, Oasis provides resources to New Covenant Lutheran Church in East Cleveland for their "Encounter" worship service and wages for youth employees of Youngstown's urban farm run through Martin Luther Lutheran Church.

Thank you for your support of thousands of youth over the years. When Oasis reaches youth with the saving Grace of Jesus Christ, they are forever connected to the power of God as they live their lives strong in faith. Lives have been changed. Thanks for everything! - Rev. Dr. Lisa Arledge

CRLC members recall the fun visit of the Metro45 food truck to our parking lot, in fall of 2022. The food was delicious, plentiful and well received! The slogan of the food truck, "great food, a better story," reflects their mission. As a part of Lutheran Metropolitan Ministry, this social enterprise provides life changing services to those most in need. Along with feeding individuals living without shelter, they offer culinary training to empower and support change.

Currently, the food truck is able to employ an entire staff, comprised of women and men, coming direct from the LMM Chopping for Change program. This program trains incarcerated individuals in the culinary arts. Their training is instrumental in preventing recidivism by teaching marketable work skills.

The Metro45 food truck is nearly booked for the entirety of the summer 2024 season! It will be appearing at many local festivals and events along with regular visits to food truck parks. Metro45 also offers catering services, available to individuals, companies and other organizations, upon request.

Saying Grace

Whether you do it hands folded or hands holding, if you were raised Lutheran, chances are you've either said or heard someone say grace at a meal at some time in your life. Maybe you still do it often. A recent study found that perhaps this is no longer the case in many American households. In a 2022 study on Prayer in America, researchers found 32 percent of Americans say grace daily. That means that 68 percent do not say grace daily.



There is a 1951 Norman Rockwell painting on the subject that sold for \$46 million dollars a few years ago. There are paintings dating back to the early 1600s of people saying grace as well.

Dictionary.com explains saying grace this way: The word *grace* here signifies asking for God's blessing or giving thanks for the food being served. [Early 1300s].

There is a website that discusses the etiquette of saying grace.

My Aunt had a book she kept in a drawer of her dining room table called Graces and when our family visited, we would pick something from the book to read before our meal.

"Come Lord Jesus be our guest and let these gifts to us be blessed." is the first prayer I learned for saying grace as a child. It is known as the Common Table Prayer and some say it is the best known mealtime prayer among North American Lutherans.

Wikipedia has a posting about saying grace that takes you through an astounding array of different ways to say grace across the spectrum of well known faiths and many say grace both before and after the meal. This gave me great joy to see that across all faiths around the globe, people take time to show gratitude for their meal and thank the God of their understanding. Saying grace is something else we have in common with others around the world.

According to OpenBible.com there are 42 verses that reference blessing food before eating meals. So, you might say 'it's a thing'!

Perhaps saying grace is an act of not only gratitude and an expression of faith but also an opportunity for fellowship. Perhaps we need to bring saying grace back into our lives.
