#### THEO-THURSDAY RETURNS



## CONCERTS @ CRLC—A COMMUNITY OUTREACH MINISTRY OF CHRIST THE REDEEMER LUTHERAN CHURCH

I would like to share with all of you my ideas for a music series at Christ the Redeemer Lutheran Church: *Concerts @ CRLC.* Its goal and aim come from Martin Luther's quote: "Next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise". *Concerts @ CRLC* is a community outreach ministry of Christ the Redeemer Lutheran Church. This concert series seeks to provide diverse programming and will offer something for everyone.

I am envisioning three concerts in the Spring and three concerts in the Fall, beginning in 2025, with guest artists such as Organist Dr. John Behnke, Pianist Dr. Maria Thompson-Corley, Flute/Harp Duo Angela Massey and Rachel O'Brien, the Brecksville High School Choir, the Cleveland Flute Choir, CSU Percussion Ensemble, Harpist Kirk Kupensky, the BW Men's Chorus, the Firestone Madrigals and the Stow Heritage Ringers. The possibilities are endless!

All concerts are free and open to the public and are held in the Sanctuary. All concerts begin at 4pm.

Concerts @ CRLC is supported by free will offerings and sponsorships. I am donating some funds to start the series. I am also asking members of the congregation and community to consider becoming sponsors. In the upcoming weeks, look for Concerts @ CRLC sponsorship forms in the Information Center. The sponsors will be listed in each and every concert program. Sponsorship forms will be included in each concert program and will help us continue and expand the program. Generous support from our members and sponsors help to make this offering of music to our community possible. Note the sponsor levels from the categories listed below:

The dedicated funds for the concert series will be in a separate account. Offerings and sponsorship funds will be used solely for the concert series. I will track incoming offerings/sponsorships and oversee the account. I will be responsible for preparing the budget and coordinating/contacting the musicians. I will request checks for payment of the musicians and am the "go to" person for questions/concerns.

I will contact the sponsors/patrons annually. I would like to have some volunteers from the congregation to help with advertising, mailing lists, coordination of fellowship time after each concert, ushering and ideas/suggestions for future musicians/groups, etc.

## READINGS FOR OCTOBER

#### October 6

Today's gospel combines a saying that makes many of us uncomfortable with a story we find comforting. Jesus' saying on divorce is another of his rejections of human legislation in favor of the original intent of God's law. Jesus' rebuke of the disciples who are fending off the children should challenge us as well. What does it mean to receive the kingdom of God as a child does?

#### OCTOBER 13

The rich man who comes to ask Jesus what he should do to inherit eternal life is a good man, sincere in his asking. Mark's gospel is alone in saying that Jesus looked on him and loved him. Out of love, not as judgment, Jesus offers him an open door to life: sell all you own and give it to the poor. Our culture bombards us with the message that we will find life by consuming. Our assemblies counter this message with the invitation to find life by divesting for the sake of the other.

## OCTOBER 20

Today's gospel starts with disciples obsessing over who will be closest to Jesus, leading to Jesus teaching his followers about God's take on importance and power. Here Jesus makes it explicit that the reversal of values in God's community is a direct challenge to the values of the dominant culture, where wielding power over others is what makes you great. When we pray "your kingdom come" we are praying for an end to tyranny and oppression. We pray this gathered around the cross, a sign of great shame transformed to be the sign of great honor and service.

## OCTOBER 27

Can we pray the way Bartimaeus prays? People try to hush him up because by addressing Jesus as "Son of David" he is making a politically dangerous claim that Jesus is the rightful king. Could our prayers ever be heard as a threat to unjust powers that be? Bartimaeus won't give up or go away quietly, but repeats his call for help more loudly. Do we ask so boldly? And are our prayers an honest answer to Jesus' question, "What do you want me to do for you?"

Jeremiah 31:7-9 Psalm 126 Hebrews 7:23-28 Mark 10:46-52 We have a God who created us and loves us as unique human beings.

Many technologies are used to help medical professionals understand possible health conditions we may experience. A primary means of assessing many issues is via x-rays & ultrasound imaging. Ultrasound helps doctors make a diagnosis and determine the best, most effective means possible to achieve health.

Ultrasound: Sonography is a diagnostic medical procedure that uses high frequency sound waves to produce visual images of organs, tissues, or blood flow inside the body. Sonographers are a trained group of medical professionals who use ultrasound technology to *see the body's organs, tissues, and musculature*.

A computer analyzes the sounds from the sound waves that are bounced off internal structures in the body and creates an image of the structure. But unlike X-rays, no radiation is used. The sonographer places a small device known as the transducer against the skin in the area to be imaged. The transducer sends high frequency sound waves into the body, which are bounced off internal structures in the body.

Doctors use ultrasound in women, men, & children to gain advanced insights into the inner workings of the body. In fact, after x-ray exams, ultrasound is the most utilized form of diagnostic imaging available today. How wonderful that much information about our bodies can be obtained non-invasively!

May God continue to guide our medical care and advancement in ways to help improve our quality of life during our time in this world.

## SPECIAL GUEST DR. JOHN BYRON - RETURNS OCTOBER 13th AND 20th!



#### A NEW ADULT SERIES with

John Byron is Professor of New Testament at Ashland Theological Seminary. He completed undergraduate studies at Elim Bible Institute in Lima NY, a Master of Arts in Biblical and Theological Studies at Regent University in Virginia Beach, VA, post-graduate work at Jerusalem University College in Jerusalem, Israel and a Ph.D. in Theology at the University of Durham in England. He is the author of six books and more than 30 published articles and

essays. He served as a translator for the Common English Bible, is a columnist for Biblical Archaeology Review and excavated at Tel-Gezer in Israel. He has been married to Lori Byron since 1990. They enjoy spending their free time cycling, cooking and traveling together. In addition, they both attend worship at Pastor Karen's congregation: Peace Lutheran in Ashland, Ohio.

#### October 13<sup>th</sup>:

#### Rewriting the Bible: Versions of Bible stories your Sunday school teacher didn't know.

It is not uncommon to hear comments in the media claiming that the Bible has been changed and/or altered over time. These sound bites leave the average Bible reader wondering: Did scribes in antiquity change some of the stories in the Bible and if so why? In this lecture Dr. John Byron will look at an ancient practice of interpretation sometimes called "rewritten" Bible. Dr. Byron will provide examples of how stories were sometimes expanded and/or altered by Jewish and Christian interpreters and will explain why these scribes felt they could and should interpret the Bible this way. Dr. Byron has published a book on ways that the Cain and Abel story was reinterpreted, which will be a particular focus of the lecture.

#### October 20th:

#### Trusting in the Word of God: Is the Bible the center of our faith?

A significant majority of Americans own a Bible and consider it to be sacred literature. From the pews of the church to billboards along the highway, to the presidential inauguration, the Bible's influence can be observed and experienced at all levels of society. A quick scan of any bookstore will demonstrate that, for some people, the Bible is a book of answers. From theology to science to diets and finances, the Bible is viewed by some to be the source of all knowledge and understanding. Yet, if this is true, why are there so many disputes over what the Bible means? If the Bible is said to be "clear" on any number of topics, why isn't it always clear to those who are interpreting it? In his lecture, Dr. Byron will address the role of the Bible in Christian faith and what it means to trust in the Word of God. He will demonstrate that preoccupation with "what the Bible says" has sometimes caused us to focus our faith on the Bible rather than God.

On October 27<sup>th</sup> – Pastor Randy will start the last sessions on Frederick Buechner dealing with issue of pain and memory in our discipleship.

The courses are offered collaboratively through Zoom. Each class runs for 5 weeks and costs \$65/course + credit card fees.

#### **FOUNDATIONS CLASSES**

#### **Worship Matters**

September 26, October 3, 10, 17, 24

Why do we worship Sunday after Sunday? Is worship intended for an 'in group' to comfort and console? Is worship intended to equip for mission and service? Is worship for God or for us? As we explore these questions, we will discover tensions in worship: a God focus or a communal focus, a head focus or a heart focus, a structured worship or a free worship, a universal church focus or a focus on the local assembly and its needs.

#### Christianity in a Lutheran Key

November 7, 14, 21, December 5, 12

While all Christians share a common set of theological beliefs, Lutherans look at things through a filter of grace. In this course we will discover more about our Lutheran roots. We will also look forward to challenges that face us in the future.

#### Intro to the Old Testament

December 19, January 2, 9, 16, 23

The aims of this course are: to give the students an overview of the structure and theology of the Hebrew Scriptures and present the varieties of forms used to communicate the truth of God's Word contained in them. Special attention will be given to covenant theology and to relating Old Testament theology and history to our understanding of the New Testament.

#### Intro to the New Testament

February 6, 13, 20, 27, March 6

The goals of this course are to understand the gospel message as revealed in the New Testament (NT), to explore the life and faith of the Christian church in the first century, to understand how the Bible came down to us in its present form, and to understand and use a variety of tools for interpreting the Bible. Throughout the course students will reflect on how the New Testament Gospel has shaped our Christian lives.

#### **Lutheran Creeds & Confessions**


March 20, 27, April 3, 10, 24

This course provides an analysis of the historical context and theological content of the Book of Concord (the Lutheran Confessions) with an eye to establishing the importance of its witness for Christian mission and ministry.

#### Living as a Christian in the World

May 8, 15, 22, 29, June 5

Students will discuss and explore their role as a member of a Christian community and the community at large. This course allows students to explore their place in a community that is not necessarily predominately Christian. Begin discernment on future service and ministries in their congregations and communities.



### FROM THE NORTHEAST OHIO SYNOD—Continued

PRACTICAL CLASSES (Please take Foundation classes before enrolling in Practical Classes)

#### **Pastoral Care**

September 26, October 3, 10, 17, 24

Caregiving is the responsibility of the entire faith community. With differing gifts individuals care in a variety of ways. This course is intended to assist the faith community in its caregiving ministries and give practical guidance on how to care.

#### **Church History**

November 7, 14, 21, December 5, 12

Every 500 years society and its institutions go through major changes. The church, too, has been emerging in the same pattern. This course will explore those patterns, people, and factors that have led and are now leading to a continuing evolution of the Christian movement.

#### **Elective TBD**

December 19, January 2, 9, 16, 23

In this elective course (TBD), you stretch yourself through practical study that will prepare you for a Life of Service.

#### **Cultural Diversity**

February 6, 13, 20, 27, March 6

Participants will discover their own biases and those of the institutions of which they are a part, why those biases exist, and how to confront and overcome them.

#### **Elective - TBD**

March 20, 27, April 3, 10, 24

In this elective course (TBD), you stretch yourself through practical study that will prepare you for a Life of Service.

#### **Christian Ethics**

May 8, 15, 22, 29, June 5

Participants will reflect on the implications of the Ten Commandments for contemporary life. They will be introduced to concepts and systems by which the Christian tradition has taught personal and public morality, for example, the "Deadly Sins" and "Cardinal Virtues," the "Just War" Theory vs. Christian Pacifism, human nature and human sinfulness, and Luther's "Two Kingdoms" theology. The course provides opportunity for disciplined reflection on ethical issues such as sexual ethics, sanctity of life, political witness, and economic justice.








Online Giving
