FROM THE PASTOR

"In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace."

(Luke 1:78-79)

Where are you looking for the light? An age-old question, even with connections back for some of us to our Sunday School years of singing "This little light of mine – I am going to let it shine." I do not know about you, but there are times when that light seems really dim. For many in our world, in our country, these are times when it feels like it is hard to find the light. Whether it is in political results, impacts of financial hardships, vocational challenges, or relationship struggles, we often need not only to look at how we shine our own light, but where we look to find the source of light. I am reminded that in our end of the year Gospel texts that happen in Pentecost this past November, we heard the disciples and other hearers of Jesus become really rattled when Jesus says of the sacred temple: "not one stone will be left upon another." Jesus is pointing to God in ways that mean more than a building. Sometimes we look for light to come from our human-made institutions like temples, church buildings, and other human relationships, but all of this is temporary. The true light of the world doesn't come through Scripture, through human hands, through buildings, it comes in the way of a God made flesh, a God incarnate. As we prepare for the arrival of the true light of the world, may we all experience a light that will shine on those of us all who dwell in darkness! May this word made flesh light up your life this Christmas!

CRLC MUSIC MINISTRY ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS 2024

Rev. David Eck's Everlasting Light liturgical setting

CRLC will begin utilizing Rev. David Eck's Everlasting Light liturgical setting for Advent, 2024. Rev. David Eck has been the pastor of Abiding Savior Lutheran Church, Fairview, NC since 1993. He earned his MDiv from the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Gettysburg. He is a singer/songwriter who has released a number of worship CDs as well as devotional and liturgical materials. Pastor Dave lives in Asheville with his husband, Gary Mitchell, who is a retired school teacher and church musician. Together, they have two adopted children and two granddaughters. His Everlasting Light setting is based on carols of the season.

Marty Haugen's Holden Evening Prayer Dec. 10 and 17 at 7pm

Written in 1985-86 by Marty Haugen during a musical residency at Holden Village, Holden Evening Prayer is a simple Lutheran vespers service that follows traditional form while using contemporary and inclusive language. Since then, the service has been adopted around the world and continues to be used weekly at Holden Village where it is lovingly known as Vespers '86. Once a year Holden invites Villagers across the globe to come together through participation in the Holden Evening Prayer. Together, we seek to support and draw strength from one another, reaffirming our values as people who have been called, equipped, and sent, and supporting each other's work in environmental stewardship and justice for all people.

DECEMBER 1-First Sunday of Advent

Advent is about the "coming days." God's people have always lived in great expectation, but that expectation finds specific, repeated enunciation in the texts appointed for these four weeks. The ancients anticipated a "righteous Branch to spring up for David." The Thessalonians awaited "the coming of our Lord Jesus with all the saints." Jesus' contemporaries hoped for the time "to stand before the Son of Man." With them we eagerly await the coming days: another Christmas celebration, a second coming, and the advent of Christ in word and supper.

DECEMBER 8 - Second Sunday of Advent

Forerunners and messengers advance the advent of our God. While John the baptizer's voice in the wilderness may be the principal focus of the day, Malachi's prophecy could as easily herald the coming Christ as forerunner of the Lord of hosts. Finally all the baptized are called to participate in the sharing of the gospel. In so doing we prepare the way for the coming of Jesus and assist all people in capturing a vision of the "salvation of God."

DECEMBER 15-Third Sunday of Advent

Christ's presence in our midst in the wonder of the holy supper is cause for singing. The nearness of the God in prayer, in every circumstance, is cause for rejoicing. The coming of one "more powerful" than John, even with a winnowing fork in hand, is good news—and cause for exultation—for us who are being saved. Great joy is the tone for the third Sunday of Advent.

DECEMBER 22 - Fourth Sunday of Advent

Cradle and cross are inextricably connected on the fourth Sunday of Advent. Between a lovely tribute to the little town of Bethlehem and Mary's magnificent song of praise, the letter to the Hebrews reminds us in no uncertain terms that Christ's advent is for "the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all." It is the kind of tension in which the church always lives as when in holy communion—with high delight—"we proclaim the Lord's death."

December 29 - First Sunday of Christmas

On the first Sunday of Christmas we find the boy Samuel and the boy Jesus, both in the temple, both growing in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and humankind. We too have returned to the house of God "to sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God," who has gifted us with a savior. As the festival continues, "let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts." It is Christmas, still.

1 Samuel 2:18-20, 26 Psalm 148 Colossians 3:12-17 Luke 2:41-52 From the cold weather to holiday meals, it's important for individuals with allergies or asthma to be aware of potential risks they might face during the holidays: **Allergies, Asthma and the Winter Holidays**.

<u>Food Allergies</u>: Food plays a central role in many events. Food allergies can make these functions difficult to navigate. Ask about the ingredients used to make each dish. Be aware that crosscontamination can occur during preparation. If you think the foods served pose too much risk, or if you just don't feel comfortable eating foods provided by others, you can bring your own meal or snacks or eat before you arrive. If you use medications for your allergy, be sure to bring those along so you're ready for an emergency.

<u>Trees and holiday decorations</u>: If you are around a live tree, the tree itself is unlikely to cause an allergy, but the mold, pollen, tree sap or chemical sprays on it can. Use of an artificial tree or letting a real tree dry in an enclosed space for a week before bringing it inside can help.

Dust and mold can accumulate on decorations, especially if they're stored in a damp basement. Wrap decorations in plastic before storing them or use a tree bag to keep them free of allergens. Wipe down & air-dry decorations before packing them away. Wash your hands after unpacking decorations.

Poinsettias, a member of the rubber tree family. Although the risk of a severe reaction is low, it's best to avoid direct contact with this plant if you have a latex allergy.

Scented candles & wood-burning fireplaces can cause headaches, watery eyes & aggravated noses. Avoid holiday air fresheners. Gingerbread, pumpkin, & pine scents can be inviting for some, yet hazardous for others.

<u>Traveling Points to Remember</u>: Travel causes exposure to winter triggers and inconsistent use of medications can cause asthma or allergy symptoms to flare around the holidays. If you're visiting friends or relatives over the holidays, you may encounter all kinds of triggers — whether from perfumed fellow travelers or your friends' pets that send your allergic reactions into high gear. Cold dry outside air can also trigger asthma. Before traveling, make sure you're up to date on your medications. Take them before your trip — and be sure to pack whatever you need to get through your travels with as little difficulty as possible. Asthma can also be triggered by exposure to the cold/dry air of winter. Our increased exposure to viral infections during these winter months is an additional concern for asthmatics.


Holiday celebration increase our times of hugging & kissing- hello & goodbye, therefore assisting respiratory viruses to get passed around. If you have a cold, use good judgment about close physical contact. Remember the basics: wash your hands frequently with soap & water or an alcohol-based hand sanitizer. Cough or sneeze into your sleeve or a tissue rather than your hands. In addition, make sure to take care of yourself-get enough sleep, manage stress, & stay hydrated.







Online Giving Convenient. Simple. Secure.

This option will allow for folks to contribute to our congregation using their credit card or debit card. There is not a cost for the church to host this ability, however this is a cost to us for every transaction that is processed. The donor however, can add this fee to any donation they make using this process so that the church receives the full amount intended. This will allow for folks who prefer to handle their giving in this way. This can be used for a one-time donation or it can be set

up for reoccurring contributions. It also will allow specific giving to specific funds in our church. You also can download an app for your phone, and after a one-time set-up, you can easily use your mobile device for giving. Donors also have the ability to have recurring donations directly charged to their Bank or S&L checking or savings account through the church Simply Giving program without needing to use the on-line system.
