SUMMER 2025 LITURGY MUSIC

Hymn of Praise: Shout for Joy, Loud and Long

"*Personent hodie*" is a Christmas carol originally published in 1582. The most common English translation of the text is by Jane M. Joseph (1894–1929). She translates the title as "On this day earth shall ring". The text for *Shout for Joy, Loud and Long*, was written by David Mowbray. Born in 1938, Wallington, Surrey, England he attended Dulwich College, Fitzwilliam, Cambridge. He gained an MA at Trinity in Bristol and a BD at London. Ordained in the Church of England, he was a curate at St. Giles in Northampton and at St. Mary's in Walford. Appointed Vicar of Broxborne, Herts in 1970. In 1984 became Vicar of All Saints, Hertfordshire and in 1991 he was appointed Vicar of St. Matthew's Darley Abbey, Derby. He has been writing hymns since 1977 and most of his texts are represented by Jubilate Hymns.

Gospel Acclamation: Halle Halle Hallelujah

This Caribbean melody is a paraphrase of Psalm 150. The original music and setting is by Hal H. Hopson. Hal H. Hopson is a prolific composer, arranger, clinician, teacher and promoter of congregational song, with more than 1300 published works, especially of hymn and psalm arrangements, choir anthems and creative ideas for choral and organ music in worship. Born in Texas in 1933, with degrees from Baylor University and Southern Baptist Seminary, he served churches in Nashville, TN and most recently Preston Hollow Presbyterian Church in Dallas. He has served on national boards of the Presbyterian Association of Musicians and the Choristers Guild and taught numerous workshops at various national conferences. In 2009, a collection of 64 of his hymn tunes were published in *Hymns for Our Time: The Collected Tunes of Hal H. Hopson*.

Sanctus: Holy, Holy, Holy Lord

This melody comes from Mass No. 5 in A-flat major composed by Franz Schubert. This setting and the later Mass in E-flat major are regarded as Schubert's "late masses". These are distinguished from his four early masses by their "musically interpretive stance to the words". The Schubert scholar Brian Newbould considered the late masses to be the composer's "two finest and most substantial settings". Mass No. 5, as well as the unfinished setting of the oratorio *Lazarus*, are seen as products of Schubert's reflections on life and death.

Agnus Dei: Lamb of God

This setting of the Lamb of God was composed by Marty Haugen (b. 1950). Haugen holds a B.A. degree in psychology from Luther College and an M.A. degree in pastoral studies from the University of St. Thomas. He has composed liturgical settings, choral arrangements, sacred songs, and hymns as well as psalm settings. He holds a position as composer-in-residence at Mayflower Community Congregational Church in Minneapolis.

JULY 6—4th Sunday after Pentecost

God is the source of our nourishment. Jesus' invitation to "take and eat . . . take and drink" is a repeated one. In holy communion, in the word read and proclaimed, in the assembly of the people of God, the dominion of God has come near. Rejoice! Your name is written in heaven.

JULY 13—5th Sunday after Pentecost

To love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, strength, and mind is to reflect God's mercy in responding to one's neighbor. That mercy found its most profound expression in the "gospel that has come to you"—namely the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. That gospel mercy comes to us again today: at the font, at the table, and from the pulpit. It is very near to you.

JULY 20—6th Sunday after Pentecost

Perhaps the church, at its best, is "all ears." God urges the faithful, again and again, to "listen up!"—to heed the word that gives life. So it was with Abraham and Sarah, Mary and Martha, and the early church at Colossae. So it is today as we join the assembly to hear the word of God, the word of life.

JULY 27—7th Sunday after Pentecost

Persistence in prayer is encouraged by Jesus and wins the attention of God when Abraham intercedes for Sodom. The life of the baptized—to be rooted and built up in Christ Jesus—is to be nurtured with prayer. God hears and answers prayer and so strengthens God's own. "When I called, you answered me; you increased my strength within me."

Luke 11:1-13

Summertime safety is an important focus. As the temperature rises so can tempers. **Violence and conflicts** can be a concern for adults in terms of "road rage", other behavior such as **public bullying & rudeness impacts all ages**. God calls us to live lives exemplified by being "...not violent but gentle, not quarrelsome" (1 Timothy 3:3).

Help protect children from violence:

- ◆ pray for personal wisdom & patience/pray for children
- ◆ model non-violence at home, work and play
- ◆ teach children **anger management & conflict management techniques**
- ◆ limit exposure to violence; guide children to understanding violence
- ◆ ask children if they feel safe at school
- ◆ be physically present
- ◆ encourage children's involvement in extracurricular activities such as music & sports
- ◆ teach children how to respond in unsafe situations. Be attentive to personality changes in your children.
- ◆ trust your intuition - if something doesn't feel right to you...it probably isn't - follow up on your concerns.



Are your children interested in playing with new neighbors or going to new friends' homes? You try to provide a safe environment in your home - don't hesitate to evaluate the safety of homes they are visiting. **Gun safety** in our communities should be a concern. This is addressed by the ASK (Asking Saves Kids) Campaign <http://askingsaveskids.org/>. Asking about guns in the home can be added in the midst of other **things you might normally discuss before allowing your child to someone's house – such as internet access, video games, animals (pets) or allergies**. Presenting your concern in a respectful manner is modeling responsible parenting.

Personal security that deters crime includes decreasing opportunities for criminals to find you vulnerable. **Walking alertly and assertively**, aware of your environment and looking directly at others is considered to be a crime deterrent.

Anger management techniques: count to 10 & consider will this really matter in a month? Find out what your stress/anger triggers are. Ask for & accept help. Focus on problem solving in frustrating situations- instead of using energy to be angry, you'll learn how to redirect your energy to resolve the situation. <https://raisingchildren.net.au/grown-ups/looking-after-yourself/anger-anxiety-stress/anger-management-for-parents>

Prayer is also an important tool to use to calm our minds and provide us with peace as we acknowledge the dangers in our sinful world. As we seek to be wise in our actions, may we also seek God's guidance and comfort when we see the impact of crime in our world. May our actions serve to help ourselves remain safe, as well as assist others who have been victimized or are in need. **"A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger" (Proverbs 15:1)**





Did you know that we have the ability to receive online giving through our website?
(www.crlcbrecksville.org)

This option will allow for folks to contribute to our congregation using their credit card or debit card. There is not a cost for the church to host this ability, however this is a cost to us for every transaction that is processed. The donor however, can add this fee to any donation they make using this process so that the church receives the full amount intended. This will allow for folks who prefer to handle their giving in this way. This can be used for a one-time donation or it can be set up for recurring contributions. It also will allow specific giving to specific funds in our church. You also can download an app for your phone, and after a one-time set-up, you can easily use your mobile device for giving. Donors also have the ability to have recurring donations directly charged to their Bank or S&L checking or savings account through the church Simply Giving program without needing to use the on-line system. Please contact the church office to get more information or to set up this option."
