FROM THE PASTOR

"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." (Hebrews 13:8)

January is here—the month that smells faintly of leftover pine needles, half-finished cookies, and our wildly unrealistic New Year's resolutions. This is the time of year when we all decide we're going to become better people, or at least people who floss more consistently. And then by about January 10th we remember who we actually are: God's beloved mess, emphasis on beloved.

Anne Lamott once wrote that grace "means you're in a different universe from where you had been stuck, when you had absolutely no way to get there on your own."

So as we step into this new year, here are three invitations—less like resolutions and more like gentle nudges from a God who already loves us exactly as we are, not as we promised we'd be by mid-February.

1. Show up—even if you're tired, late, or slightly grumpy. God never asked us to be perfect, only present. Besides, some of the holiest moments happen when we're barely holding it together.
2. Be extravagantly kind—to others and to yourself.

Maybe this year we try something new: talking to ourselves the way God talks to us—gently, patiently, with a warmth that borders on embarrassing.

3. Look for God in the odd places. Anne Lamott says that "Earth is forgiveness school." Earth is also a divine scavenger hunt. God hides in the ordinary—your morning coffee, a phone call that comes right on time, that one kid at church who gives you a hug with the full force of a linebacker. Pay attention. God has a habit of showing up in the weirdest, most wonderful ways.

May this new year bring you peace, laughter, surprising joy, and the unmistakable feeling that grace has you by the elbow, steering you gently forward.

April 12, 2026: Gospel Disciples in Song



READINGS FOR JANUARY

JANUARY 4 – Second Sunday of Christmas

Within the gospel reading's profound words lies the simple message that God is revealed in a human person. Though we may try to understand how the Word existed with God from the beginning of time, the wonder we celebrate at Christmas is that the Word continues to dwell among us. Christ comes among us in the gathered assembly, the scriptures, the waters of new birth, and the bread and the wine. Through these ordinary gifts we receive the fullness of God's grace and truth.

JANUARY 11 – Baptism of Our Lord

In the waters of the Jordan, Jesus is revealed as the beloved Son of God. Through this great epiphany, Jesus fulfills all righteousness and becomes the servant of God who will bring forth justice and be a light to the nations. In the waters of baptism we too are washed by the Word, anointed by the Spirit, and named God's beloved children. Our baptismal mission is to proclaim good news to all who are oppressed or in need of God's healing.

JANUARY 18 – Second Sunday after Epiphany

Today's gospel opens with further reflection on Jesus' baptism. He is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world and the one anointed by the Spirit. In the liturgy we come and see Christ revealed among us in word and meal. We go forth to invite others to come and worship the Holy One and to receive the gifts of grace and peace made known among us.

JANUARY 25 – Third Sunday after Epiphany

Jesus begins his public ministry by calling fishers to leave their nets and follow him. In Jesus the kingdom of God has come near. We who have walked in darkness have seen a great light. We see this light most profoundly in the cross—as God suffers with us and all who are oppressed by sickness, sin, or evil. Light dawns for us as we gather around the word, the font, and the holy table. We are then sent to share the good news that others may be "caught" in the net of God's grace and mercy.

“Now to him who is able to *keep you from falling* . . . ” (Jude 17:24)

Falls are a leading cause of injury among all ages. Much is written about “Fall Prevention” but newer thoughts include **“How to Fall Safely”**. Parachute jumpers learn this & programs for safe practice are being offered in some locations. If you feel like you might fall, it’s important to stay calm. Tensing up & reaching out with your hands, instead of reaching out with your hands, try bending your elbows & knees. This can prevent injuries, to your wrists or elbows.



How to Fall Safely: When falling forward, aim to distribute your weight across your arms and hands while **turning your head to protect it**. Avoiding serious injuries like head trauma, broken wrists, or hips is the priority. If possible, *try to roll* during the fall to reduce impact. After a fall, take a moment to assess your condition before attempting to get up, as jumping up too quickly could worsen an injury. THREE BEST EXERCISES TO PREVENT FALLS <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=XYPuITr7v4k>

Consider these risks factors & tips to decrease your chance of falling this winter:

Foot awareness – Replace slippers that do not stay on your feet! Wear boots or shoes with rubber or neoprene soles & tread to decrease slipping. Winterize shoes, boots & assistive devices-spikeless ice & shoe chain/snow shoe gripper sole covers (from sporting goods stores); ice gripper cane tips are available.

Balance issues - Wear gloves to allow you to keep hands out of pockets for improved balance & *hold on railings*. *Take small steps*, especially on slippery surfaces. Do you need a grab bar anywhere?

Be Alert! – Look for icy patches, check for melted snow or wet flooring at home or when entering buildings. Have a safety plan for getting help (phone in your pocket). Dress for winter weather. **Don’t rush!** *Carry a small baggie of kitty litter in your pocket to cast out ahead of you as you walk on slick surfaces.*

Lighting – create & maintain proper lighting to aid in seeing hazards. Consider *motion-sensor lighting* or a *fall alarm system* if you live alone.

Muscle weakness – muscles weaken as we age, affecting strength & balance. Exercise as able. Request gym guidance or physical therapy to *develop balance & strengthening routine* to increase/maintain muscles.



In November, seventeen of your fellow CRLC members refreshed their training on the use of CPR and AED.




LADIES BIBLE STUDY
